### Why Youth Development?

- In Sacramento County, one out of four students will not graduate from high school.
- 3,451 area youth are currently in foster care. 318 of them will age out of foster care with no place to live.
- Only 32% of Sacramento County 11th graders (who took the California Healthy Kids Survey) report caring relationships in school settings.
- Only 15% of 11th graders report meaningful opportunities to participate.

Research shows that youth who experience caring relationships, safe places, opportunities to participate and give back to community, and engaging skill-building opportunities are more likely to thrive. Not all young people have equal access to these supports for healthy development.



# Ettore Ravazzolo



Ettore Ravazzolo was only 16 years old when he moved from his small hometown in Switzerland to begin a 3-year, full-time apprenticeship at a bakery in Zurich. While he lived with the owner's family and studied, he also earned his first paycheck as a pastry chef: \$10 per month! But Ettore quickly distinguished himself as one of the top apprentices in Zurich and became a talented pastry chef/confectioner, before he turned 20 years old.

To complete his required military service, Ettore joined the Swiss Army and was employed as a chef for the mountain infantry. Imagine cooking for 200 soldiers based at 14,000 feet in the Alps! This would be the first of many adventures that would lead Ettore to America and eventually, to his home in Sacramento.

When Ettore opened his European Bakery in 1985, he made wonderful desserts, sweets and cakes that people had never seen or tasted before. His insistence on using only quality ingredients, combined with his specialized training and a flair for presentation, quickly made Ettore's a favorite destination. Today, the bakery walls are decorated with the many awards for "Best Bakery" and "Best Dessert." Ettore himself continues to be one of the most popular TV chefs in Sacramento.

Ettore's wife, Meggan, is Supervising Manager of the Fair Oaks location and you'll often see their son Harrison bussing tables and answering customers' questions. Their younger son, Reilly, hangs out after school, doing homework and testing the latest batch of cookies. Their youngest son, Lucas, can often be spied in the arms of one of their many Supervisors, being toted about or rocked back and forth near the warm oven to help him take his naps.

Through cycles of food fads and customers' changes in taste, Ettore has remained consistent in what he believes makes food and dessert special: quality ingredients and unique style.
